KOLKATA MARY WARD SOCIAL CENTRE

Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre (KMWSC) is a local non-profit organization registered under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act of XVII, in June 2014. The KMWSC is a unit of the Loreto Sisters where projects on education, child protection and women's empowerment are being implemented to reach out to the needlest sections of the society. The organization assists vulnerable children and women and helps to protect and rehabilitate them. KMWSC has made its way through many difficult terrains and stood out to become a pioneering institution of social work.

Mary Ward, the foundress of the Loreto Congregation had instilled the core values of

Justice, Peace, Freedom and Integrity into the ethos of the Institution. Inspired by these values KMWSC is reaching out to the poor, oppressed and socially excluded. KMWSC has gone beyond its capacity to bring in social justice and equal opportunities for all those whose lives they have touched.

Presently, the organization is proudly running 11 projects. The organization, through the services of its motivated workforce, has successfully reached far and wide to care for the ones most uncared for. It is only the strong desire to bring a change in the lives of the benefactors and the love of thousands of well-wishers that has brought the organization to where it stands today.

Provisions of the Constitution of India

- ▶ The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act of 2009: The law mandates free and compulsory education to all children aged 6 to 14 years. This legislation also mandated that 25 percent of seats in every private school must be allocated for children from disadvantaged groups and physically challenged children.
- ▶ Article 24 of India's Constitution prohibits hazardous child labour.
- ▶ The Child Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act of 1986: The Act prohibits the employment of children below the age of 14 years in hazardous occupations identified in a list by the law. The list was expanded in 2006 and again in 2008.
- ▶ The Factories Act of 1948: The Act prohibits the employment of children below the age of 14 years in any factory. The law also places rules on who, when and for how long pre-adults aged 15–18 years can be employed in any factory.
- ▶ The Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection) of Children Act of 2000: This law made it a crime, punishable with a prison term, for anyone to procure or employ a child in any hazardous employment or in bondage.

Reality

- ▶ Census 2011 showed that about 32 million children aged between 6 and 13 years have never attended any educational institution, even though government estimates of out-of-school children show substantially lower numbers.
- ▶ The 2011 National Census of India found the total number of child labour, aged 5–14, to be at 4.35 million, and the total child population to be 259.64 million in that age group.
- ▶ India's National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) 2014 reported 73,549 missing children in the country out of which 31,711 were untraceable
- ▶ 2,020 cases of procuration of minor girls were reported in the year 2014 as compared to 1,224 such cases in the year 2013, accounting for an increase of 65.0% over 2013. West Bengal has reported 852 of such cases.
- ▶ As per the Census, **2011 the child sex ratio** (0-6 years) has shown a decline from **927 females** per thousand males in 2001 to **919 females** per thousand males in 2011.
- ▶ **School dropout rate** amongst adolescent girls in India is as high as 63.5% (Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation MoSPI, 2012)
- Nearly 45% girls In India get married before the age of eighteen years (National Family Health Survey III - NFHS)
- ▶ Out of the **400 million children in India**, every second child is malnourished (National Family Health Survey III NFHS, 2005-06)
- An estimated **11.6 lakh children die** every year within one year of their birth due to lack of immunisation. (Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India)





BAREFOOT TEACHERS TRAINING programme embodies the principal concept that 'People only need feet to walk; shoes are a luxury'. For years we have been fulfilling the goal to give practical exposure to grass root level teachers. The training programme has now been remodelled with interactive insights and latest methodologies to provide a unique experience to the participants. A new generation of teachers equipped with the latest methods of teaching are being created by the training programme for rural and urban India.








BAREFOOT TEACHERS TRAINING

- ▶ Through this programme we have trained 186 teachers in 3 languages (Bengali, Hindi, English) covering standards Nursery to Class 2.
- ▶ 8 Training Programmes covered an overview of education, discussion on pedagogy of Language and Mathematics teaching methods, as well as developing teaching and learning materials. Demonstration class has helped teachers to facilitate the learning process swiftly and actively and this in turn has helped children to learn spontaneously.




- ▶ This Training has reached out to grassroot level teachers from Bolpur, Medinipur, Howrah, South 24 Parganas and Kolkata who are from village schools or even drop-outs or who have no route or access to teacher training, particularly as they have scholastic qualifications which are lower than Class X.
- The key word in the course is Creativity. The trainee learns, not just to reproduce methods and teaching aids but to make them her own and use them as stepping stones in developing his/her own way of doing things.
- More than 3500 children have benefitted so far.

SENSITIZATION ON HUMAN TRAFFICKING PROJECT

is being run in 10 Gram Panchyats under Canning- I Block namely Matla I, Taldi, Nikarighata, Daria and Itkhola which being close to Canning railway station are an easy transit route for the traffickers. The project pledges to prevent trafficking of children, girls and women while at the same time generating awareness on women and child protection issues among the villagers.

Cases handled by KMWSC -April 2015-2016



We have realized that trafficking is inhuman and is against our basic human rights.

Trafficking of women and girls is rampant in this area and this is primarily due to lack of awareness. Presence of Community Vigilance Committee and its efforts have boosted the confidence of the people in the community and they are now alert to monitor the outsiders entering the community and informing the committee when required

- Formation of 6 Community Vigilance Communities and Adolescent Girls Groups each with 20 members was successfully implemented and is shouldering the responsibility of acting as a safety net. Training and workshops on Child Protection issues have made them adept in their work of vigilance.
- ▶ 60% members of the Community Vigilance Committee are women. In 5 Community meetings majority of the women in Self Help Groups participated in the discussions.
- ▶ Sensitization of the Community, has educated more than 1400 people about child marriage and issues concerning human trafficking. It encouraged them to make informed decisions.
- ▶ Capacity Building Programme for 250 Local Self Government officials at the Gram Panchayat level has enabled them to make the correct decisions whenever violation of child rights has taken place in their areas.
- November 2015, 150 girls from the 5 Adolescent Girls Groups participated in the programme and shared their thoughts and dreams of a society free of child abuse.
- Protection issue at Canning 1 Block reached out to approximately 1500 children. Discussion on child trafficking, child marriage, child abuse and child labour equipped children to recognize, report and respond to abuse, exploitation and violence.

LODH A COMMUNITY PROJECT is being run in Sagar Block in South 24

Parganas to bring a change in the lives of the children of the Lodha community (a marginalized tribal community living in Bengal) through education along with the inclusion of health and hygiene practices.


- ▶ 23 children from the Lodha community and 47 children from other communities are receiving inclusive education at the Centre, bridging the gap between the Lodhas and the people of other communities.
- ▶ Advocacy at the Panchayat Level has brought electricity to the Lodha residential areas.
- ▶ 5 successful Health Camps conducted for the community people with participation of on an average of 78 patients has ensured reach-out of medical facility to the far flung island village.
- First ever sensitization on Women and Child's Rights was brought to the fore by the celebration of Women's Day, Girl Child Day, Children's Day. These occasions have made women and children realize the value of their lives in society.
- The community has sought admission of 4 new children to the Centre which reflects that the community is sensitized about the importance of education in a child's life.

HIDDEN DOMESTIC CHILD LABOUR project works for the education, protection and rehabilitation of the deprived children who are involved in domestic work as well as child labour in 8 wards of Kolkata Municipal Corporation and Kamarhati and Baranagar Municipality.

I started attending the training sessions on Facility Management .Right now
I am working at Kothari Medical Hospital
as an Assistant Caregiver and earning
Rs 5500 per month.I am independent and also taking care of my family











- ▶ 97 children are now better skilled after receiving life skill education training.
- ▶ 31 Child Domestic Workers have been motivated and empowered to complete their vocational training and have received placement.
- ▶ 8 children between 15 20 years have received placements in well reputed organizations including Cafe Coffee Day (CCD), Kothari Medical Hospital, Great Eastern Hotels, Grand Hotel and Big Bazaar. This has helped to rehabilitate the children.
- ▶ 77 community people have been involved in Resident Welfare Achievement meetings. Out of this one Residential Welfare Association in an apartment complex has declared their complex child labour free.
- ▶ 8 Child Protection Committees (CPC) has been formed which have acted positively as:
- CPC members of Baranagar Municipality
 Ward 6 at Alambazar have started taking
 moves as per the Action Plan. They have
 identified 2 Child Domestic Workers
 (CDW's) from their locality and referred
 them to Loreto Sealdah Rainbow Home for
 residential education facility.
- Children Group members of Ward–13 are very empowered about their rights. They reported a child labour case to Childline and raised this issue in front of CPC.
- In Ward 12 a kind and positive employer provided Deba Mishra who is a Child Domestic Worker and a student of Class V in Ultadanga United High School with books, which was very encouraging for him.
- ▶ 360 school children, 64 school teachers and 82 college students were oriented on child labour centric issues which enhanced their responsibility towards child welfare.

COMMUNITY AND ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMME










- ► Children are taking interest in co-curricular activities. A Summer Art Workshop was arranged for them, where 70 children participated and made flower vases, flowers, cards. 90 children participated in the Sports Programme. This gave them a new avenue of recreation.
- Women keen on income generation took part in 4 training programmes. 55 women participated in making various handcraft items.
- This year (2016) there are 170 children in the two Centres, whereas in 2015 there were 120 children.
- Women's Day was celebrated in both Centres. 87 women enjoyed and learnt about the rights and entitlements of women.
- → 49 children between 6 months and 5 years of age received Vitamin A and Albendazole oral administrations which has prevented them from acquiring vitamin deficiency related diseases.

JHARKHALI EDUCATION PROJECT is being run at Jharkhali in

South 24 Pagarnas to provide remedial support to needy children as well as to conduct Teachers Training Programmes for the capacity building of the teachers of various Sishu Shiksha Kendras and Mardhayamik Shiksha Kendras.



KMWSC is the first organization at Jharkhali which is extensively doing Community Awareness Programmes on child protection issues. More and more number of women and farmers attending the meetings and discussing issues on child protection is one of the greatest impacts of the project."




- ▶ 60 children are receiving remedial educational support which has improved their academic performance.
- ▶ 2 training programmes conducted for 45 teachers of Sishu Siksha Kendra and Madhyamik Siskha Kendra on Anti-Human Trafficking initiatives and Family Planning.
- Lesson Plan Development and Continuous Comprehensive Education has enabled teachers to guide their children in a better way and acquire depth in various subjects.
- ▶ 20 volunteers from the John Scottus School imparted knowledge to 200 students on English language skills.
- ► Community meetings with 240 women and orientation of 200 children on women and child protection issues and formation of 20 member Community Vigilance Committees have helped in creating a safe environment for women and children in the area.

PROVIDING EDUCATION AND PROTECTION TO

VULNERABLE CHILDREN: The children of commercial sex workers

lead a life of oblivion in the infamous by-lanes of Asia's largest red light district, **Sonagachi**. To educate and enlighten these children is one of the latest pledges of KMWSC. Bringing smiles to the faces of the mothers is also a part of our effort by training them in diverse vocational trades and creating alternative livelihood opportunities for them.



I have struggled a lot for what I have achieved. The support from my trainer has allowed me to continue with the Beautician Course even though I was totally tied down by housework.

I have learnt new beauty treatments and techniques and I hope to continue with the course.

My trainer encouraged me and gave me confidence, and my life a new direction. I am looking forward to making a sustainable income for my family, so that we can have food for everyone in the house. I feel a bit more secure for myself and my family now."

PROVIDING EDUCATION AND PROTECTION TO VULNERABLE CHILDREN










- ▶ 35 children of high risk group are receiving recreation oriented education from the Multipurpose Activity Centre (MAC) which complements their lack of an educational environment at home.
- Providing Beautician Training to 10 commercial sex workers, which is creating possibilities for alternative means of livelihood for them.
- Providing unique recreational opportunities for the children of CSWs through various events and workshops, like Art and Craft Workshop for children to make paper collage. Celebration of Independence Day created an atmosphere of joy and happiness. These programmes are proving successful in giving joy to the children and making their day different from the rest of the days.
- ► KMWSC is organizing auto campaigns, puppet shows so that community is aware of the facilities of education available for the children. As a result more children are enrolling in the Centres.






THE BRICK FIELD SCHOOLS

are no doubt very unique as they are

open air schools and set up under the shade of trees or temporary shades. Each school has a trunk in which all the materials for setting up the school is kept. Every morning the teachers of the school carry the trunk to the school area. They take out the teaching learning materials and hang them on a string to create the temporary open air class. They also take out the stationery that the children require to attend the classes. After 3 hours of class when the children leave, the teachers very diligently wrap up the class and store the materials back in the trunk. Thus the school everyday appears out of the trunk and again is locked up in the trunk, thus exists "the trunk – brick field school".



For the last 6 years Kalimata Brick Field School is running at my premises. 80 children are attending classes on a regular basis. Health Camps are organized, that ensure not only basic learning of the children but also teach them basic hygiene.

We are very happy to provide sheds during Health Camps and school days."

BRICK FIELD SCHOOLS

- ▶ The Brick Field Schools are open air schools. Since 2008, KMWSC has facilitated open air schools under the shade of trees for 5 Days a week for 3-hours a day for the children of the migrant workers living in brickfields on the outskirts of Kolkata.
- ► Each Brick Field School has 2 teachers and around 50 children. Presently there are 60 Brick Field Schools functioning over 9 distinct locations in the districts of South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas, Hooghly, Howrah and Birbhum.
- Each school has a trunk in which all the materials for setting up the school are kept. Every morning 120 teachers of 60 Brick Field Schools in different locations carry the trunk to the school area. They take out the teaching learning materials and hang them on a string to create the temporary open air class.
- ▶ 3246 children are attending Brick Field School regularly. More children, especially girls, are attending the classes in spite of working in the brick fields. For these poor migrant children these open-air schools are the only school they have.
- organized in 60 Brick Field Schools.

 Regular Parents Meeting are helping in generating awareness about their children's education and on social issues. Parents are actively sending their children to the school now.
- Majority of the Brick Field owners are very happy to provide a place for the school and they are cooperating with us.
- Health Camps and Awareness Sessions conducted in 3 phases for all 60 BFS have been completed successfully. We have been able to reach out to 2000 people through Health Camps.

BRICK FIELD SCHOOLS

- ▶ Health Camps are organised at regular intervals to meet the specific needs of the community and to deliver medical services to Brick Field Schools. The camps also ensure provision for timely referral services to the patients for further specialized care.
- The uniqueness of the Camps lie in its comprehensive approach where health promotion and prevention are given equal importance and curative care is administered.
- ▶ Puppet Show has been used as a tool for creating awareness throughout the year on safe migration, Right to Education, Right to Information, child marriage, Interstate Migration Act and Government schemes.
- ▶ Regular monitoring visits are a very important part of the Brick Field School Project. KMWSC staff visit each BFS twice every month for monitoring and assessing the teachers performance. 294 visits last year ensured quality teaching.
- ▶ 4 Teachers Training programmes organized has been able to bring qualitative changes in teaching methodology of different subjects, making them more interesting and student friendly for the children. Trainings have helped to enhance communication skills between students and teachers, between peer groups, as well as in enhancing learning and grasping skills of the children.
- KMWSC provided a variety of extra-curricular activities for children that included Drawing Competition, Sports and Christmas Celebration. The children look forward to the recreational activities, sports and special events. Recreational opportunities have facilitated the process of positive development of children and has played a significant role in influencing their behaviour.
- ▶ One of the greatest achievements was that an 11 year old girl, Reshma Kumari who had migrated from Navada to West Bengal was found in Kulpi. The girl was taken back to Nawada and admitted in Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya in 2015.
- ▶ During the Nawada intervention programme the staff of the project visited 14 districts of Nawada to make the people aware about the importance of education and admitted 82 children in ICDS schools and 251 children in local schools.














SOLAR ENLIGHTEN AND COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

PROJECT is implemented in **Gosaba Block** in **South 24 Parganas** to create awareness on solar and other alternative sources of energy, while providing solar lanterns and educational support to the children and women of poor families in the village.

KMWSC programme on solar lights has benefitted the community in the following ways




I have two daughters, Rakhi (6 years) and Purnima (4 years). Rakhi has been admitted into the Centre. Solar lights have highly benefitted us.My daughter can study attentively and I can do my household work at the same time.













- There are 4 Learning Centres in 4 areas of Manmathanagar village where there is still no electricity. These Learning Centres function as Solar Centres.
- ▶ 140 children are enrolled in the Centres at Manmathanagar out of which 40 are new admissions. They are receiving remedial education as they are not able to afford it on their own.
- ▶ Children are taught with innovative methods and have learnt the English and Bengali alphabets and numbers. They have also learnt the names of seven days in a week and names of the months of the Bengali calendar.
- ▶ 58 children have been mainstreamed into formal education and they are now attending school regularly.
- ▶ 40 sessions conducted over 4 Centres for generating awareness on the importance of education. As a result attendance of children at these Centres has increased.
- Year 2016 marked completion of building the Solar Centre at Manmathanagar where 100 solar lights have been assembled by the staff, which in future will be distributed in the community.
- 9 community meetings were held to spread awareness on solar light and use of solar power as an alternative source of energy, in the following areas Gopal Kata, Amra Methi, Kachukhali, Bon Anchal para. We have got a positive response.

EDUCATION OF THE URBAN DEPRIVED CHILDREN

was started from April 2015. The project provides education to the deprived children of **Jyotinagar Colony**. Presently there are 32 students.







It is so rewarding to be able to share my knowledge with young people at the Centre and watch them bloom.

Regular classes and different activities organized for children have shown a remarkable improvement in children's reading and writing skills.

EDUCATION OF THE URBAN DEPRIVED









42 children from Jyotinagar are part of us. Every day, a bus from Loreto Day School, Sealdah brings the girls to us and again takes them home safely. Children are attending Raj Rajeshwari School in Bowbazar. The bus service ensures that children attend school regularly. Children have developed social skills and confidence by making friends and socialising with others.

Teachers belonging to Loreto Lay Associates regularly guide the children. After they finish the regular school day, KMWSC provides extra tutorial support to 20 children, along with a small snack. A teacher is deputed to help with their daily lessons, as well as to improve their standard in English and Mathematics. Having a regular time to do homework is helping them and their knowledge base has shown definite improvement.

Volunteers from Cognizant are taking classes once a week, every Saturday. Children's interaction with outside Teachers/Volunteers has yielded good results. These classes help to provide them with a strong foundation.

Constant monitoring has developed healthy habits among the young children. They are maintaining proper health and hygiene.

32 Children have received books, cardigans, leggings and socks.

4 girl children from Jyotinagar were admitted into Loreto Rainbow Home, Sealdah.

Stories of Success

SENSITIZATION OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING PROJECT

Influencing Change: On 7th September 2015, Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre project staff conducted a campaign at Darikanath Balika Vidyalaya (Girls High School) in Canning on the child protection issue. During the campaign a girl, Mahira Khatoon (name changed to maintain confidentiality) aged 15 yrs, a student of 11th standard along with her teacher approached the Project Coordinator of KMWSC with her complaints. She shared that her parents are forcing her to get married and she is finding it difficult to convince her parents to allow her to study. She requested the coordinator to help her in stopping the marriage as she wanted to continue with her studies. The Coordinator, along with her project staff immediately informed Mr. Anindya Ghosh, District Child Protection Officer, South 24 Parganas and CHILDLINE India Foundation about Mahira. The project staff followed up the case and on 8th September 2015, the marriage was stopped by the Canning Police Station with active intervention of the District Child Protection Officer and Childline.



SENSITIZATION OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING PROJECT

The Journey of a Brave Heart: An active Adolescent Girls Group member of Daria Gram Panchayat, Tuktuki, has shown great presence of mind when she heard from the father of her friend Rehana Mali (name changed) that Rehana has migrated with an acquaintance of the family to Bardhaman for a job. Based on knowledge acquired

from the Sensitization Programmes conducted by KMWSC, she knew something was wrong. Taking the number of the man from Rehana's father, Tuktuki called him. She acted intelligently and appealed to the man to help her find a job. The man (a trafficker) in the hope of a probable candidate, promised to connect with Tuktuki. Wasting no time she immediately called Childline and informed the local community leaders. The community stakeholders were able to pressurize the trafficker's family to return Rehana as soon as possible. Due to strong pressure from the community and Childline, the man was forced to return to Canning along with Rehana. With everybody's help Rehana was brought back to her parents. Later on Rehana revealed that she had been taken to Bihar and was in the process of being sold to a dance troupe. Now Tuktuki and Rehana are inseparable friends.

BRICKFIELD PROJECT

Where There is a Will, There is a Way: Manisha Sardar is a 4 year old girl with a physical disability. She came with her parents from Jharkhand to Minakhan Brickfield. Her parents work in the Brick Fields of Minakhan. Unlike other children of her age, Manisha could not stand straight, since birth. First, her parents were not willing to send Manisha to school, but after KMWSC's intervention they agreed. Presently Manisha is attending the Brick Field School at Minakhan. Her parents are very supportive now and send Manisha to school regularly.



Manisha is a charming girl. She has never let her disability hold her back. Manisha decided not to be dictated by her fate but to live life on her terms. She participated in the Sports Programe which was organized in the month of May, 2015. Manisha won the second prize in "Ball in the Bucket" competition where the number of competitors were 27. She not only won the second prize, but was able to win our hearts too. She really enjoyed the interaction with the children through the game. She is a true inspiration for all of us.

BRICKFIELD PROJECT

A Positive Attitude led to Positive Outcome-Embrace Change: Reshma Kumari, a 11 year old girl, migrated to Kulpi Brick Field along with her parents in 2014. She was attending the Brick Field School during session year 2014-15. After completing the BFS session she went back to her native village at Nawada. During our intervention at Nawada we were able to identify Reshma in her village. We came to know that Reshma had left school due to family problems. We tried to convince her parents to get her



admitted in school. We were successful in our efforts and finally with her parents consent we admitted her in Kasturba Gandhi Residential Home in Class VI. After few months we did a follow - up visit and found remarkable changes in Reshma. She is performing well in class now and enjoying school life. She is also getting access to the government facilities. Her parents are regularly meeting her in the residential school. The residential school has brought a ray of hope not only in her life but also in the life of her parents. She shared that from now onwards she will continue with her studies in the residential home until she becomes 15 years old. Reshma truly has set a example for other brickfield children.

EDUCATION OF DEPRIVED URBAN CHILDREN



Finding Hope in the Midst of Despair: Raju Mir, son and brother of CSWs had been born and brought up in the red light district of Sonagachi. When he was young he fell in love with a CSW and soon they were together. The couple gave birth to a girl, Heena. But Heena was deserted when she was just 15 days old as her mother eloped with her lover. Since then Heena has been in the care of her grandmother and aunt. Though they looked after her, she was not allowed to attend school regularly, and even was physically abused by her aunt. Raju remained away from the house till late at night for work. He was very worried and wanted to put Heena in a

residential care where she could be safe. Heena's progressing adolescence worried Raju even more. He wanted his daughter to be out of the red light area.

Heena was identified by one of the teachers of KMWSC and brought to the Centre. One day during a home visit they got to meet Raju who expressed his desire to send Heena to a hostel. Assessing the vulnerability of the girl child and to relieve the fears of her father, Heena was admitted to the Rainbow Home through the intervention of the KMWSC staff.

Now Heena happily lives at the Rainbow Home and is regularly attending school. Her father, Raju finds his fears rested and is happy that KMWSC came to the rescue of his daughter.

LOTUS CHILD PROJECT



Helping Hands made a Big Difference: Sagarika Sardar was left without any educational help when the Chaulgola Lotus Child Educational Centre closed down a few years back. Her father and mother leave home everyday early in the morning for work leaving her alone to look after herself. She gradually found it difficult to cope with her studies as she reached higher classes and her grades in school started deteriorating. It was a boon in disguise when the Lotus Child Centre reopened at Chaulgola in

2015. She soon started coming to the Centre and availed the remedial educational help. In no time, taking help from the Centre teachers she started faring well in her studies once again. Now her parents are no longer worried about her education and they are very thankful to the Centre for opening a window of opportunity for Sagarika.

LOTUS CHILD PROJECT

Reframing the Path to School: 12 year old Sonia Raut longs to go to school. "Who will look after my younger brother and cook at home if I go to school?", asks Sonia. Sonia's parents, in order to earn a living, leave home early in the morning and return late at night. Though they send their young son to school every day but were reluctant to send Sonia to school. Sonia's life was dull before the opening of the Lotus Child Centre as she was only doing household chores. But the Centre gave her a chance to learn read and write and live her childhood as she had always wanted to. She has progressed and now can write her name and read as well. Twice everyday she attends the Centre with the children as well as with the adults. We are at present trying to

convince her parents to send her to a residential school where she can live as a child.



HIDDEN DOMESTIC CHILD LABOUR PROJECT



Caring For The Most Vulnerable: Deba is a 13 year old boy, living with his younger brother Biki Mishra (9 years) and his sister Riya Mishra (6 years) and widowed mother in small hut beside the canal in Ward no - 12 Ultadanga, Kolkata -4. Deba's father was suffering from cancer for a very long time, before he expired in 2015. Since then, the entire responsibility of the family came on his mother's shoulder. His mother works as a domestic maid and earns Rs.1500/- per month. As they are very poor the family faced lots of problems to meet the expenses, and there was no one

to look after the siblings at home. In this situation Deba started to work along with his mother to support the family. On 4th September'2015, Deba and his 2 siblings were identified by the MAC Facilitator through a routine survey and were given the offer to attend MAC. Initially Deba was not willing to continue his education as their financial condition was not good. During this time the KMWSC Facilitator met with Deba's employer and convinced him to get Deba enrolled in the MAC programme. Finally they started coming to MAC and after 2 weeks, Deba was enrolled in Ultadanga United High School in

Class – V. His brother Biki got admitted in Class – II and his sister in Class – Pre Primary in the same school. The mother is very happy now as her children are going to school regularly. Deba has seen his mother struggling throughout her life, so he wants to study hard and get a better job to support his family in future. Deba's employer helped him to continue his studies and also provided him school materials for encouragement.

HIDDEN DOMESTIC CHILD LABOUR PROJECT

A Ray of Hope: Kajal was a child domestic worker. She is 19 years old and stays in Ram Chandra Bagchi Lane, Alambazar Ward – 7 along with her parents. Kajal got married 2 years ago. After marriage she faced lots of problems in her in-laws house. Santu, her husband was jobless and addicted to drugs. He used to even physically torture her regularly so she left the house and started staying in her mother's house. Her father is bedridden for a very long time and her mother works as an adult domestic



worker along with her younger sister to support and run the family. Her family income is approx 2000/- per month, which is insufficient to meet the family needs. Kajal somehow managed to complete Class – V from a Bengali medium school (Bata School) which is near her house. Kajal was identified by the MAC Facilitator and was encouraged to come to MAC but her parents were unwilling to send their daughter to MAC. After much effort made by the Facilitator she started coming to MAC, and was enrolled in the Beautician Training course. She continued her 2 months on job training from Bablin Parlour at Dunlop. Since she was not able to afford the local travel, MAC facilitators helped her with that. Now she is working in Ritty Parlour and earning Rs.1800/- per month.

She and her parents are very happy as she is not dependent on anyone. She is earning and supporting her family through the income. Kajal thanked Save the Children and Loreto for changing her life.

LODHA COMMUNITY PROJECT

Spreading The Light Of Education: Rahul Bhakta was born and brought up in his maternal uncle's house. He is 7 years old now. His father Sukumar Bhakta earns Rs 2500 per month. For the last one year Rahul has been living with his parents. Both his parents work in the paddy field. He has five members in his family. As the financial condition of his house was not good it was diffcult for him to continue his education. Rahul started working with his parents to help augment the family income. His grandfather is undergoing treatment and physically not well. We made several home visits to convince his parents to send Rahul to our Centre while making them aware of the need for education for their child. Finally, we were successful in convincing them. Like other children Rahul now comes to the Centre and enjoys reading and having fun with friends. At the end of the year we are planning to mainstream him. Rahul is showing the way to others who are hoping a better future.





LATEST INTERVENTIONS

BEUATICIAN TRAINING PROGRAMME:

With a vision to impart job traning and business skills, the three months course started from October'15. The marginalized youth are the major attendees of the basic course where trainees are trained on the intricacies of a beautician's skills.

- ▶ All the candidates attending the training are from the economically backward, minority communities which makes the course a much needed tool for them to earn a respectable living.
- ▶ An official inauguration programme for the course was organized in November'15.

TAILORING TRAINING PROGRAMME:

Another addition was made to programmes of KMWSC in March'16 – Tailoring Training programme. A six month comprehensive course intends to train tailors with professional skills.

▶ 49 candidates are being trained in two shifts regularly.

KMWSC wishes to inspire, hope and create opportunities for a better tomorrow for the marginalized in the society by celebrating its annual event of One Billion Rising.










NETWORKING & ADVOCACY

- ▶ State level consultation on the issues of migrant labours was conducted by KMWSC at Seva Kendra Calcutta on 24th of September 2015.WBSCPCR, Labour Dept., Childline India Foundation and other NGO's participated in the consultation. The panel consisted of Mrs. Manisha Bhattacharya— Deputy Labour Commissioner (unorganized sector).Mr. 1.S Chatterjee, Shri Asokendu Sengupta, Chairman, West Bengal Commission for Protection of Child Rights, Shri.1.S Chatterjee, Deputy Director, State Child Protection Society (Govt of West Bengal),Shri Partho Roy, Executive Director, Calcutta Action Society & Activist, RTE Forum and the Director of KMWSC.
- ▶ Consultancy Meet organized by KMWSC involved various stakeholders including Government and Organizations who played a role in the lives of migrant children. As a result Sarva Shiksha Mission assured that migrant children will be included in the existing ICDS.
- Networking with Government hospitals in Kaikala Brick Field School led to government doctors attending and treating patients in Brick Field health camps.

- competent staff who are providing essential Vitamin A & Albendazole tablets to malnourished children who have deficiency of Vitamin A. This initiative is a boon for the young children.
- ▶ Collaboration and networking helped a Brick Field School student to be successfully placed in the Kasturba Gandhi Residential Home at Nawada District.
- ▶ District Level Consultation on Anti —Human Trafficking issues was conducted by KMWSC at IITD, Thakupukur on 22.012.2015. 29 NGO's from South 24 Parganas District participated in the consultation on Women and Child Protection issues.
- ▶ Block level consultation on Anti-Trafficking Initiatives in collaboration with Child Development Project Office in Canning 1 Block was conducted. Around 100 ICDS workers from 10 Gram Panchayats participated where strategies to combat human trafficking from source area was discussed.






Building the capacity of new and current staff is an essential part of KMWSC programme implementation. The organization believes in developing resource within its staff members which will enrich the quality of work and lead the efforts of the projects towards success.

- ▶ A training on Project Management and Fundraising was conducted by Seva Kendra Calcutta by Fr. Lord Winner from 18th to 23rd of May 2015 which was attended by staff.
- ▶ From 11th May to 24th May 2015, 2 KMWSC staff attended a residential training on Gender, Sustainable Development and Women's Empowerment in Himachal Pradesh. The training was organized by JAGORI GRAMMEN Organization.
- ▶ A training on service delivery programme of Vitamin A supplementation and de-worming was conducted by Vitamin Angels at Pragyalaya, Barasat which was attended by KMWSC staff. This was organized in the months of May and September.

- ► KMWSC had organized training for staff on Communication Skills. 21 staff members of KMWSC participated in the programme. Ms. Suparna Rudra, Psychotherapist and Art Based Therapist, conducted the session on Communication, Barriers of Communication and Listening Skills.
- ▶ 7 Hidden Domestic Child Labour Project staff attended 5 days life skill training called 'Lalita & Babu' (organized by SAVE the Children); the content was based on the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) which highlighted 13 thematic areas such as Me, Myself and I, My Emotions, Gender Challenges, Violence and Substance Abuse etc.
- ▶ 2 staff of KMWSC attended workshop on report writing organised by Save The Children at Hotel Orkos in September, 2015.
- ▶ On 8th & 9th December 2015, 'Save the Children & New Horizon Team' organised a capacity building programme for the 10 grassroot level field workers. Topic was Self Analysis through Group Activities.


