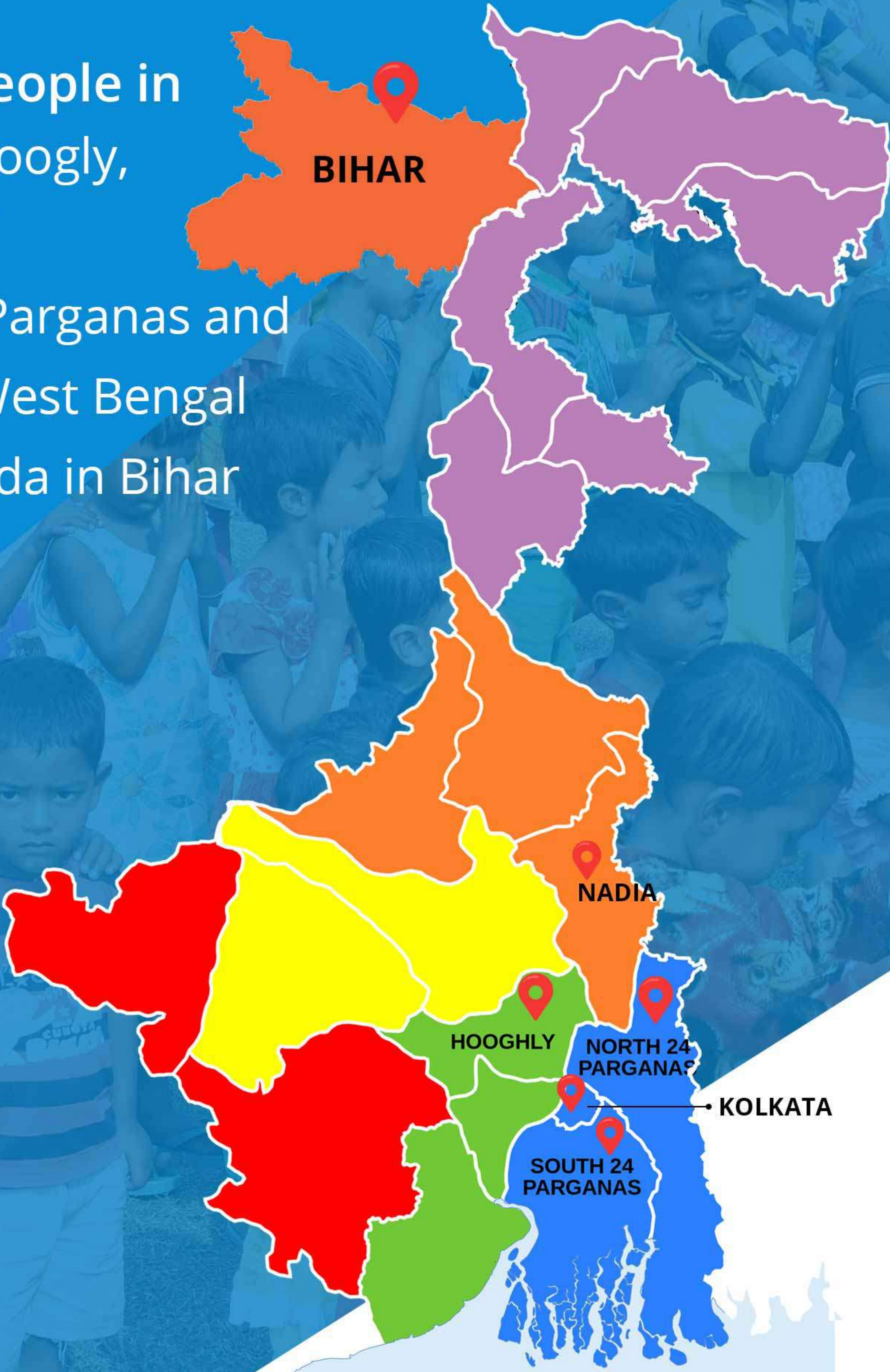

Canning is a key source-cum-transit point of human trafficking. Canning is also a major doorway to enter the Sunderban Islands, which is a geographically disadvantaged area due to its topography and a delta which connects the rivers with the Bay of Bengal. Every year, people struggle to resettle their habitats due to frequent saline water flooding which affects their paddy fields.

For the past 3 years, the Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre is implementing a project on Anti-human Trafficking Initiatives in 10 Gram Panchayats of the area.

2 Vocational Skill Development for Vulnerable Women and Adolescent Girls in Canning

Geographic Location: Canning Town

The project works as a preventive measure at the source areas of human trafficking. The project has been designed for the women and adolescent girls so as to capacitate them to earn and become self dependent. Adolescent girls drop out from schools lured by the agents of human trafficking. Due to the abject poverty they are born into, these girls get easily trapped if they are given hope of any alternative means of income, or get involved in a love relationship. The key element of the project is that the survivors of human trafficking and young women from below poverty line families will get training in two chosen trades, free of cost.

2 PROVIDING EDUCATION AND PROTECTION TO VULNERABLE CHILDREN

Geographical Coverage: Ward 18 of KMC, Sonagachi

Specific Objective: Upliftment of the quality of life of the CSWs and their children

Target Group:

The children of Commercial Sex Workers living in the Sonagachi Red-light Area.

- 100 children of CSWs are getting remedial coaching and extracurricular support in 2 shifts. Of the children, 49 are male and 51 are female.
- 40 CSW parents and high risk prone women of the community are also being helped.
- 10 CSW mothers are beneficiaries of vocational training programmes.

Brickfield School Project

Geographical Background- West Bengal (South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas, Hooghly and Nadia) Bihar (Nawada)

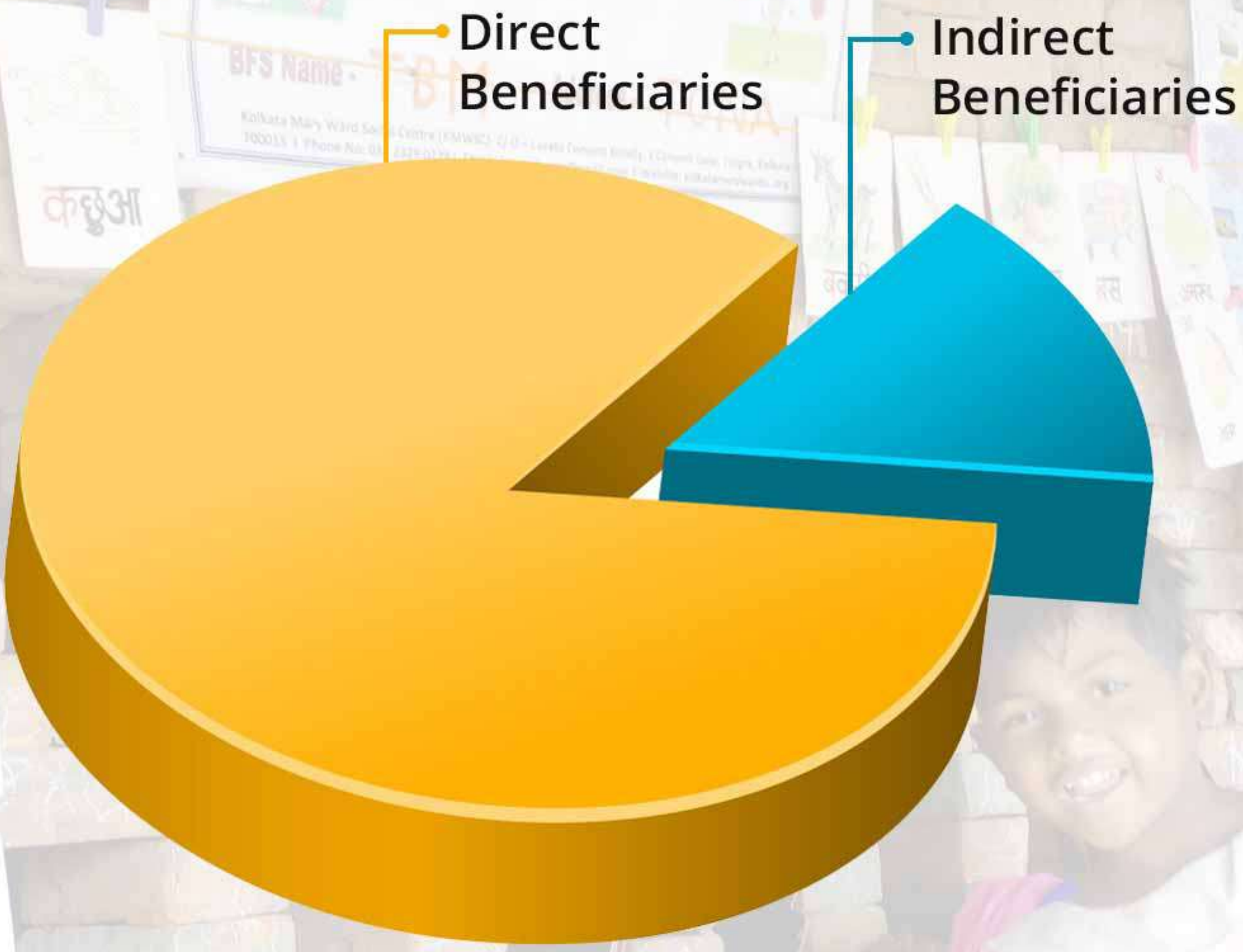
In West Bengal, the rise in the numbers and capacity of brickfields has caused an influx of migrant workers filling the job openings. The migrant workforce are mainly from neighbouring countries like Bangladesh, neighbouring states like Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha and Chhattisgarh and the neighbouring districts of West Bengal.

These migrant labourers spend almost 7 to 8 months in the brickfields, which serves as the second home to the labour force and their families, including their children, who are often involved with the household chores and also in the brick making process. Migrant families to the brickfields live in conditions where they are deprived of even the very basic amenities of life. This includes education of the children, which is disrupted as they travel to and fro between West Bengal and their native homes every year.

KMWSC has made an impact on the lives of these children by providing them informal education. Since 2008, KMWSC is providing educational support through the open air school format using non conventional modes of teaching at the brickfields all over West Bengal.

According to available data, KMWSC found that 30-40% of brickfield migrant children come from Nawada district of Bihar. KMWSC started intervening in the Nawada district from the year 2012 and started visiting Nawada with the aim of mainstreaming brickfield returned children into local Government Schools and the Kasturba Gandhi Residential School for Girls.

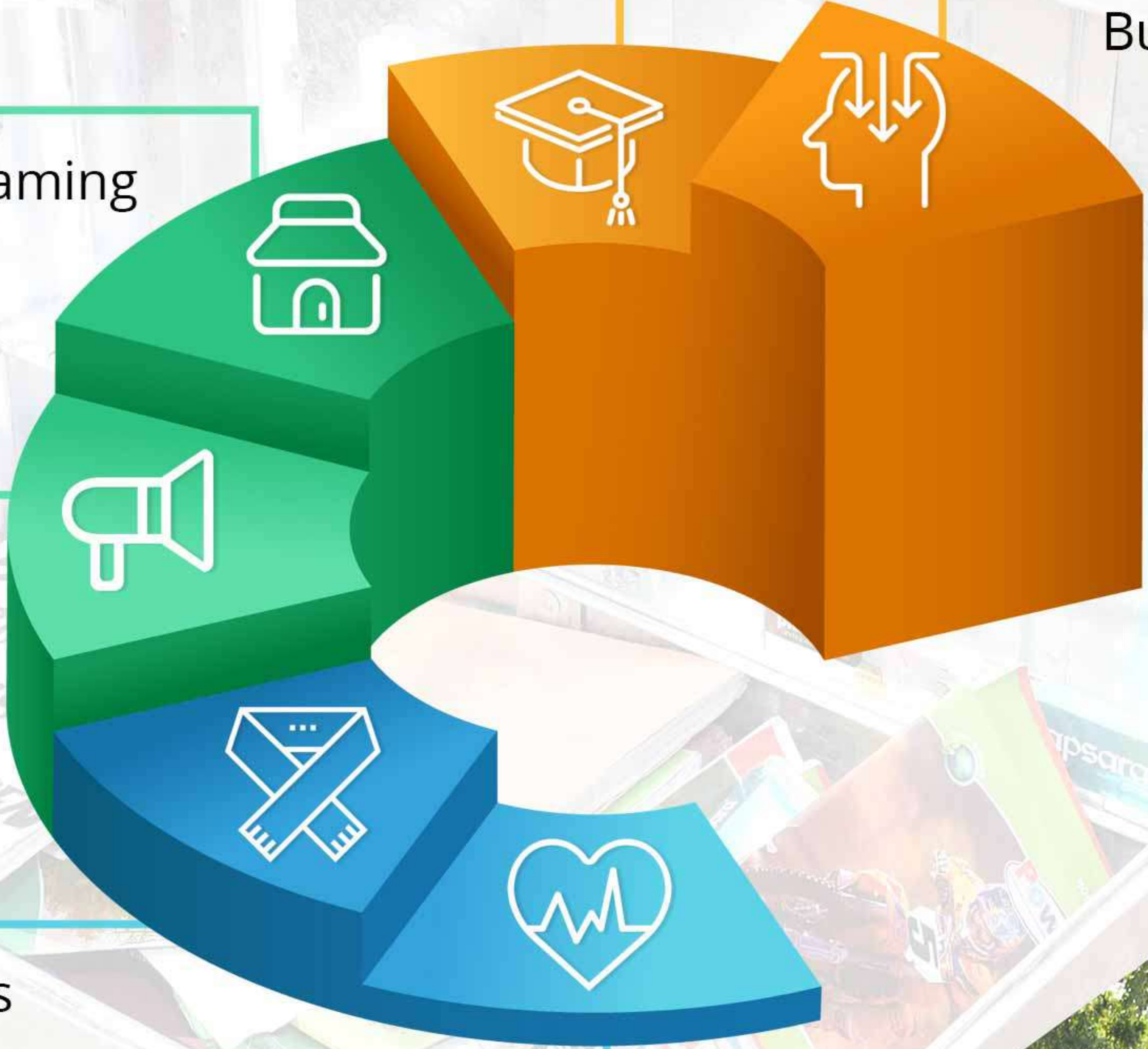

Barefoot Teachers Training

Geographical Coverage: West Bengal, Bihar and Jharkhand

This is the oldest project of the Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre, which focusses on building the capacity of teachers from rural areas on practical and joyful methodologies of teaching techniques. The project encourages the rural educated youth to use and prepare teaching and learning materials, structured lessons and highlighting the importance on area and culture specific language acquisition techniques.

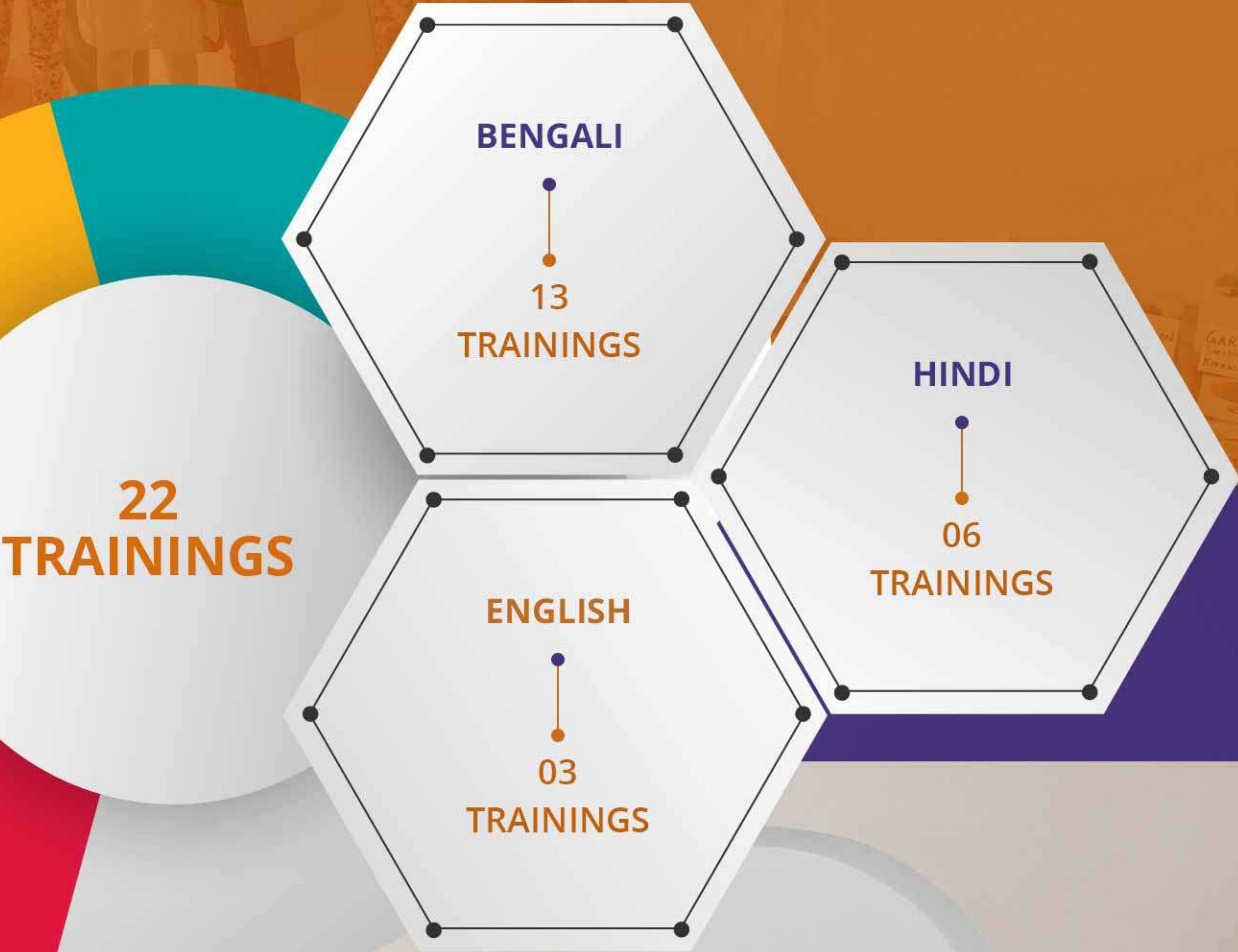
This year, through this programme, 430 Teachers from grassroots level NGOs and local schools have been trained, amongst whom 292 were women and 138 were men. Overall, 22 training sessions were conducted in Level I and Level II stages, covering Bengali, Hindi and English Languages.

India still lives in the villages. Despite considerable economic progress, poverty continues to pervade our rural areas. A visit to the remote corners of the country brings us face to face with the reality of illiteracy and ignorance. Education is the only tool that can free them, enable them to join in and contribute to the nation’s growth.

With a desire to touch the lives of the rural communities in West Bengal, the “**Community and Adult Education Programme**” was initiated in the district of South 24 Parganas

The project is functional at two villages of South 24 Parganas - Sonapota and Chaulgola. Sonapota is under the Sonarpur - Rajarhat Municipality, and Chaulgola, (near Laxmikantapur) is under the Dhanurhat Panchayat, South 24 Parganas district.

Solar Enlighten and Community Empowerment programme in Gosaba

The Sundarban forest lies in the vast delta on the Bay of Bengal, formed by the super confluence of the Ganges, Hooghly, Padma, Brahmaputra and Meghna rivers and extends across southern Bangladesh. The seasonally flooded Sundarbans freshwater swamp forests lie inland from the mangrove forests on the coastal fringe. The forest covers 10,000 square kilometres (3,900 sq mi), of which about 6,000 square kilometres (2,300 sq mi) are in Bangladesh. The Sundarbans is intersected by a complex network of tidal waterways, mudflats and small islands of salt-tolerant mangrove forests. The interconnected network of waterways makes almost every corner of the forest accessible by boat. The area is known for the Bengal Tiger, as well as numerous fauna, including species of birds, spotted deer, crocodiles and snakes.





Solar Enlighten and Community Empowerment Project has been implemented in Sundarban, Gosaba Block in South 24 Parganas, West Bengal, since August 2014, to generate awareness on solar and other alternative sources of energy. The project provides solar lights to the community people and also provides educational support to school-going children.

In the fourth year, the project has been extended to Improved Cooking Stoves/ Smokeless Chulas. Survey was done in 30 families at different locations of the village. The trainees are motivating the village people to use the new ICS for better health measures. Orders are coming from other islands too, for the construction of ICS.

Lodha Community Project

Sagar Block is an island (also known as Ganga Sagar) under Kakdwip sub-division in the district of South 24 Parganas, West Bengal. It is one of the islands in the Sundarbans which is located near the confluence of Ganga and the Bay of Bengal. Radhakrishnapur is a remote village in Sagar Block, under the Rudranagar Gram Panchyat where the Lodha Community lives at Mayagayalini Ghat. Radhakrishnapur village is far away from the main town and has a population of around 13000 people.

The Lodha community is a backward community. Previously, they would dwell in the forest and its surroundings in distressing conditions. This deplorable situation continued for long years even after the independence of the country. They had to endure social discrimination and hatred, mob-teasing, outrage from the police and mainstream sections. Even today they are considered untouchables in the society. Their children are discriminated in the schools and the community. They are made to sit in a separate place from the other children in any village function or any school programme. This is the fourth year of intervention in the Lodha Community by KMWSC, sensitizing on gender equality, providing educational support, giving alternative livelihood options and procuring identities for Lodha people.

Training on Tailoring and Bakery

Training and Production Unit for Underprivileged Youths

The Loreto Sisters for many years been operating a Bakery & Tailoring unit on the Loreto Convent Entally premises. With a vision to create a difference, the Bakery and Tailoring units have been taken over by the KMWSC since June 2016.

KMWSC aspires to create a Training cum Food Production Unit in the Bakery. While the Tailoring Training Unit will impart skills to the youngsters, the Food Production Unit will be a means of generating employment opportunities for the trainees in future. With this initiative, the drive to direct youth from marginalized communities towards a dignified future will be assured.

The major thematic area for the project is development of skills of the underprivileged youth from the marginalized communities and creating employment opportunities for them in order to assist them in leading more dignified lives.

Training in Bakery & Tailoring is a trade which requires extensive training which can be gained through practice and does not require formal education. Thus it can address the issue of youth unable to get employed due to lack of formal education.

Calcutta: It was 2001. Indonesia was in the grip of political turbulence.

Shandra Woworuntu, a widow with a three-year-old daughter, had just lost her bank job. Life, she thought, had hit rock bottom when she chanced upon an advertisement for a six-month job in Chicago. "I loved Hollywood movies and the life they showed. And I loved eating at KFC, McDonald's... The job promised \$5,000 a month. So though I would have to pay \$3,000 to apply, I saw that I would still make \$27,000. So I set off, leaving my daughter behind with my family a week before my 25th birthday."

Little did Woworuntu know that her journey would end in the brothels of New York. Till she would find it within her not only to pull through but also to punish her perpetrators. Now, she works to prevent trafficking.

"The National Crime Record Bureau suggests that there is a rise in crime against children since 2009. The number of incidents rose from 24,203 in 2009 to 92,172 in 2015, resulting in an increase of almost 300 percent in a span of six years," Kacker said.

Laki Hari

Laki Hari belongs to the economically backward section of the society. Over the years, she has seen her parents struggle to feed the family, Laki always wanted to contribute to the family income to ease the burden of her parents. After completing her course from the KMWSC Bakery Unit, she was helped by the KMWSC team to get a job in the Bakery of Taj Gateway Hotel.

Ms. Pratima Sardar

Pratima Sardar is from the 3rd batch of trainees of the Tailoring Course. She belongs to a poor family and was just a housewife before enrolling for the course. Through the Community Awareness Campaign in her village, Uttar Angadberia in Dighirpar Gram Panchayat, she came to know about KMWSC's Tailoring Course. She convinced her husband and mother-in-law to enrol her as a student in the Tailoring Course. After completion of the course she started a small business in her home, by taking orders from the neighbourhood.

Gradually she opened a small tailoring shop in a portion of her home and started giving remedial tuitions on tailoring to women and girls, who could not enrol themselves in the paid course. At present she is teaching 7 students from her own community, feels financially independent and has earned the respect of her family, neighbourhood and society. She is very thankful to Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre for making her skilled enough to earn for her family. Now she can fulfil her children's basic needs.

Shuru Biruli

During the Pujali Brickfield Health Camp on 31st March, 2018, in South 24 Parganas, the BFS teachers noticed that Shuru Biruli, who was already 9 months pregnant, was not present for the check-up. When the teachers approached her husband, Laxman Biruli, he said she has fever and they didn't want any medical assistance. It took few hours for the teachers and the BFS staff to convince him to allow her to avail the medical assistance being offered. Once the doctor checked her, he immediately referred her to the nearest hospital, as she was already in labour.

The BFS staff and the teachers who admitted her to the hospital took care of all the documentation and formalities and within 35 minutes of her admission she gave birth to a beautiful girl. The team helped the parents by supporting the nursing mother's nutritional needs, by providing her with food prescribed by the doctor.



4

Gautam Bakuli

Gautam Bakuli came for a Teacher's Training Programme from the NGO Baidyanath Vidya Mandir, Udainaranpur, Howrah, West Bengal. He attended and completed the Level 1 and Level 2 Trainings and thereafter started his own initiative to teach children at the pre-primary and primary levels. Now he is the Head Teacher of the school. He has two Primary Schools in Howrah and Hoogly districts of West Bengal.



There are 140 children and 7 teachers in his school at Howrah. In Hoogly the number of children is 135 and the number of teachers is 6. Gautam Bakuli sends his teachers for refresher courses quite regularly. The teachers come and stay for four days and learn new methodologies and activities. He also requested the trainers to give the training at his own school. One trainer went their village and took the training for four days. The number of teachers for the training was 27. The trainer described the teachers as very hard working and helped them to clear their doubts. He invited the KMWSC staff for the Annual Day celebration of the school.

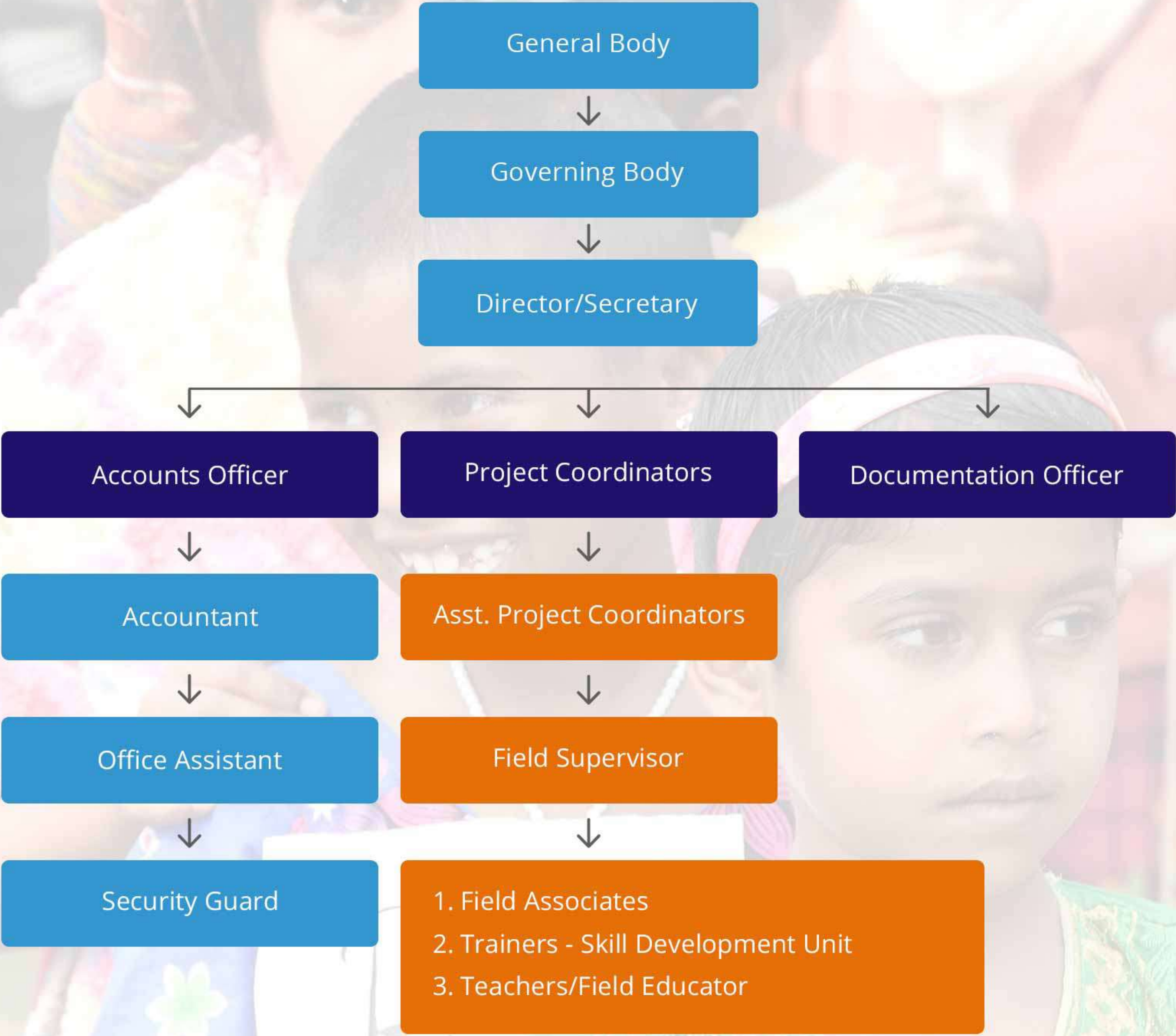

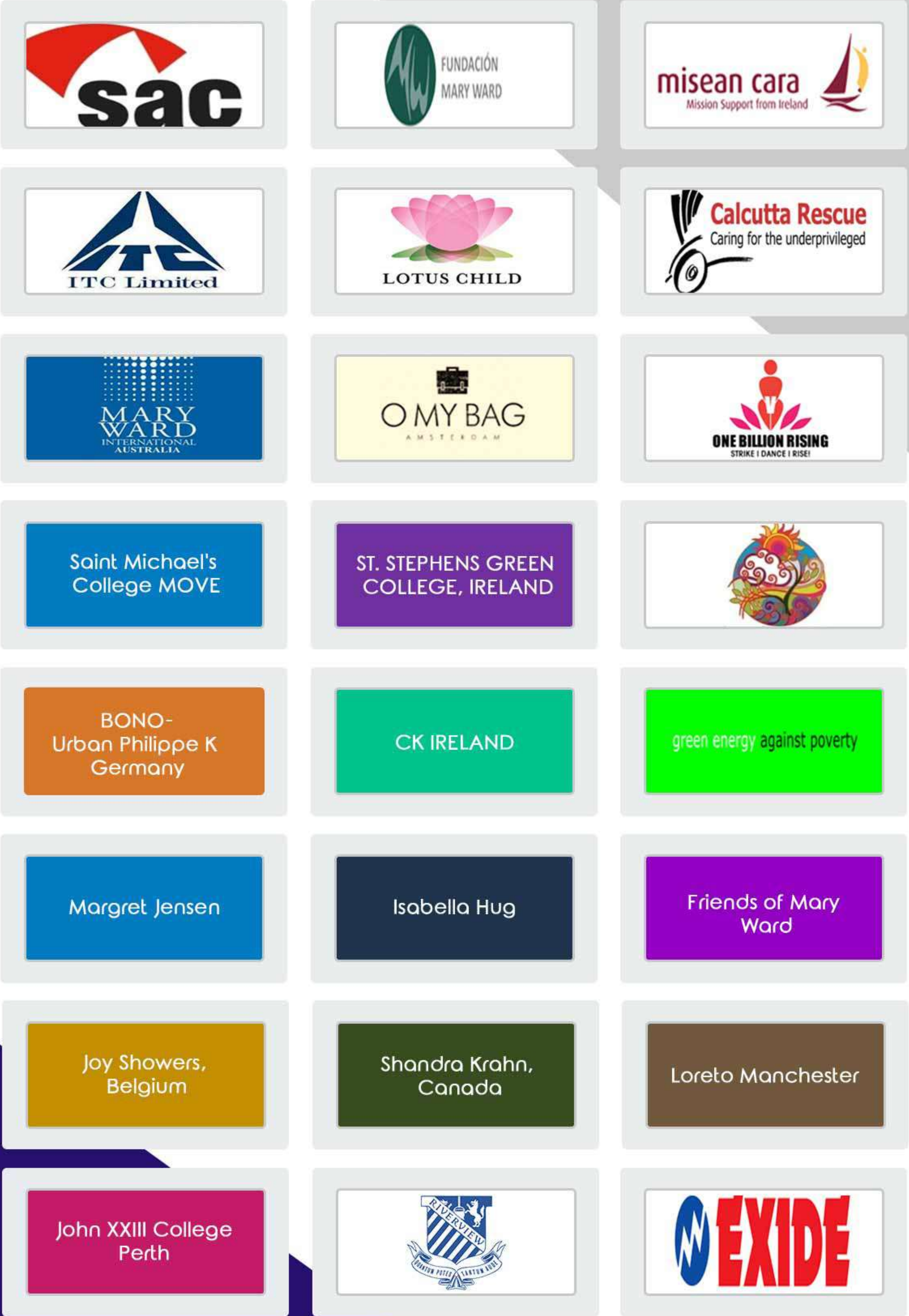
